- The phrase 'political Islam' misrepresents Islam as a peculiarly political religion. Discuss.
- In most, if not all, experiences of Islamist movements we witness a continual tension between the 'text' and the 'context'. Explain this tension with reference to at least two examples.
- Compare and contrast an Islamisation-driven Islamist movement with a liberation-driven Islamist movement. Pay particular attention to emergence, goals, strategies, and evolution over time.
- 4 'East is East and West is West' (Kipling). How far does this phrase apply to the rise of Islamism and its relations with the West? Discuss.
- Compare and contrast the ideas of the Muslim Brotherhood organisations and the Turkish Justice and Development Party (AKP).
- lslamist movements are torn between their immediate national agendas, and their trans-national utopian aspirations. Discuss.
- After over eight decades of existence, what are the lines of continuity and change in the Egyptian Muslim Brotherhood's ultimate goals and practices?
- It is an ongoing debate whether political Islam has failed or succeeded in achieving its goals. On what side of the debate do you stand and why?
