- 1 Translate the following sentences into **Japanese** (*kanji* and *kana*) [35 marks]:

2 Translate the following story into **Japanese** (*kanji* and *kana*) [35 marks]:

Almost everywhere you go in Kyōto you can see temples, shrines and other buildings that are connected to some important event in Japanese history. Often the buildings themselves are new, but the history is never forgotten, and when your Japanese friends hear the name they will usually know the story that is connected to that place. One good example is the village of Ōhara. It is well-known for the beautiful colour of its trees in autumn and many tourists visit here at the weekends. But it is also famous for a little temple called Jakkōin. The *Heike monogatari* describes how the Taira took the young emperor Antoku with them as they fled west. In the end they lost to the Minamoto in a sea battle. During the fighting, young Antoku died, but his mother was saved. When she heard what had happened, she became a nun and went to live in the village of Ōhara. You can visit this temple today, stand in the garden, and think about her peaceful life. To lose a child is always a very sad experience.
