**Reporting a Forgotten War: The Story Behind the Story of No Gun Ri**  
Mr Sang-Hun Choe, Seoul correspondent, New York Times/International Herald  
Tribune, 2000 Recipient of the Pulitzer Prize

Sang-Hun Choe (BA Hankuk University of Foreign Studies) is a correspondent for the New York Times and the International Herald Tribune. He has written extensively on US-Korea relations, South Korean politics, North-South relations, and Korean society. He has worked as the political reporter for the English-language Korea Herald and then for the Associated Press. He won the 2000 Pulitzer Prize for Investigative Reporting for his work on the story of No Gun Ri, the massacre of Korean civilians in the countryside by American soldiers late July 1950. He is the co-author, with Martha Mendoza and Charles Hanley, of *The Bridge at No Gun Ri* (Henry Holt, 2001) and the co-editor of *Korea Witness: 135 Years of War, Crisis, and News in the Land of the Morning Calm* (Eunhaeng Namu, 2006).
