Japanese Language Preparatory Reading

If you are offered a place to read Japanese Studies at Cambridge, the short period between leaving school and coming into residence offers a valuable - and necessary - window of opportunity to do some effective preparatory work.

Japanese language

Before you start your first term in Cambridge, you must do some preparatory language learning. The language course is intensive and moves very quickly. It is vital that you are completely familiar with the basic syllabaries (hiragana and katakana) before you arrive. Your knowledge of them will be assumed from the very beginning and the course does not use Romanization. Lists of these syllabaries are provided in the three books marked with a large asterisk (*) in the list below. Specialist workbooks are also available.

Japanese dictionaries

In addition to language classes, all first-year students will attend a participatory lecture and seminar series titled "Introduction to East Asian Studies" with students studying Chinese. To prepare, we <u>strongly</u> advise you to do some general reading to gain a basic understanding of Japanese history, society, and culture. There are many excellent novels but anthologies such as the *Oxford Book of Japanese Short Stories* and the *Penguin Book of Japanese Short Stories* are highly recommended.
